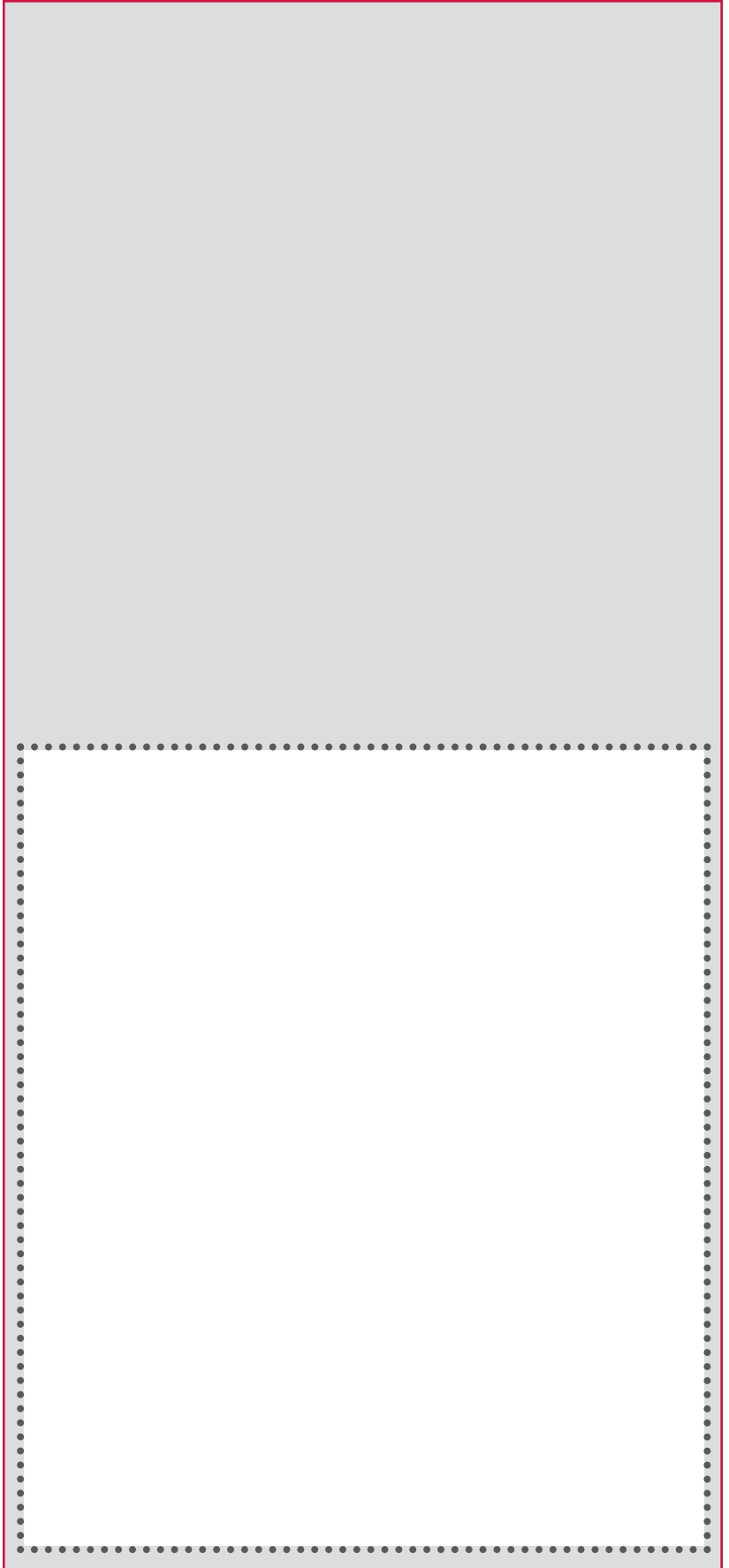


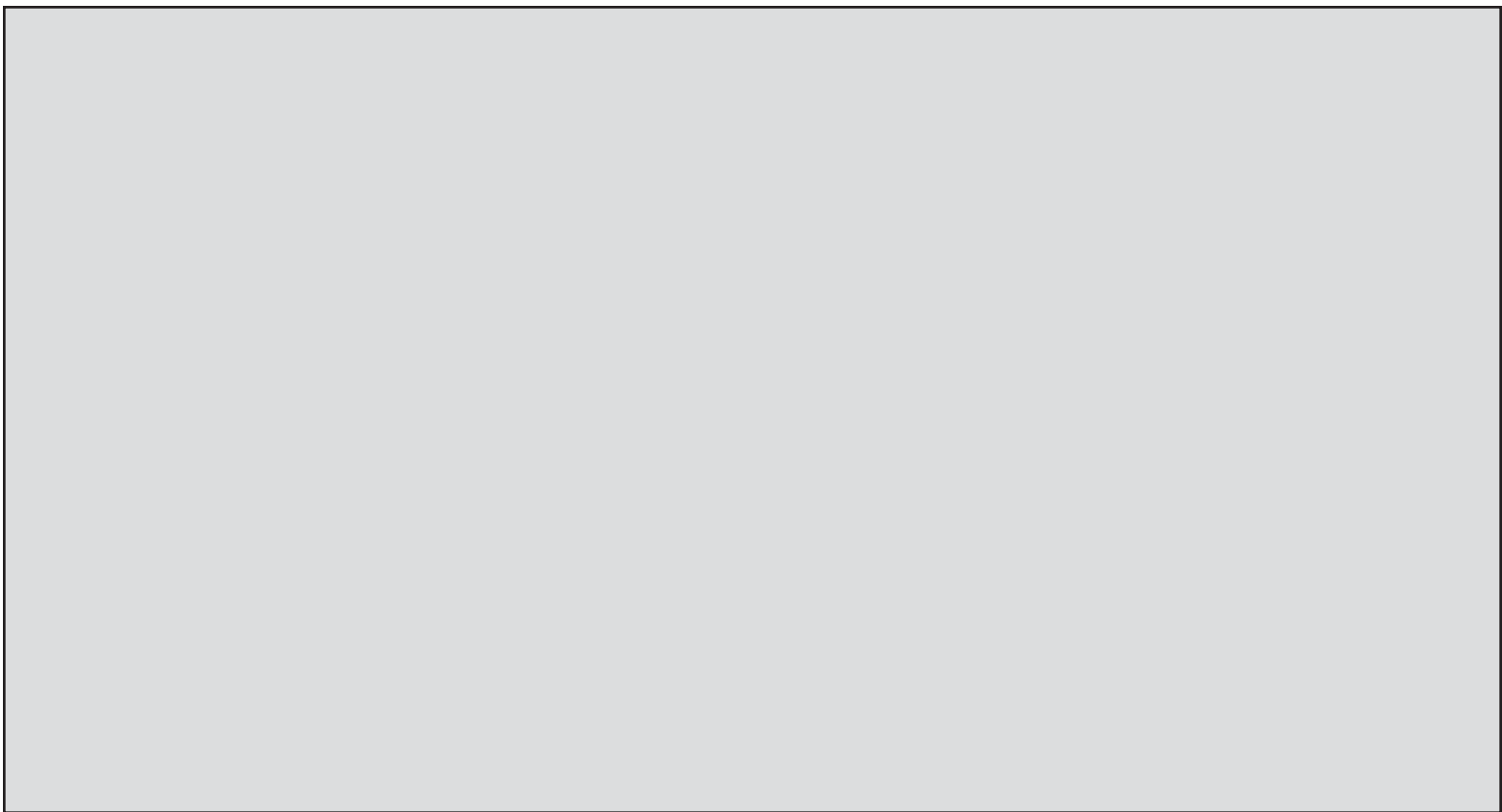
Cranes for A Cause

After studying the culture of Japan and the tragic events that happened there recently, students at RCK wanted to help. Librarian Melanie Ash did some research and came across an organization, Students Rebuild, which was hosting a worldwide fundraiser for Japan through the production of origami cranes. Familiar with origami, Mrs. Ash used her library time with students to teach them the craft and the significance of the crane in Japanese culture. For each origami crane that students created, a \$2 donation was made to the Architecture for Humanity's reconstruction efforts in Japan.

The organization anticipated the receipt of more than 100,000 submissions from around the globe. Ruth C. Kinney, in conjunction with Connetquot Elementary School, created more than 1,000 cranes to put towards the efforts. "The kids were really interested in it," Mrs. Ash said of the unique fundraiser. In Japanese culture, one crane gives good luck for a year, but 1,000 cranes will make your wish come true. Students Rebuild plans to create an art installation with all of the cranes they received.

Fourth-grade students at RCK went back in time to the colonial period of 1565. Students donned typical colonial wear and established a mock village for their parents and peers to travel through and experience life from that time. All fourth graders took on a task from categories such as foods, household chores, toys/games, jobs and school to illustrate the reality of the time. For example, students created games that were played during the era from actual materials that would have been used. They then allowed fellow students touring the "village" to try their skills
